What are CultureQuests?

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CultureQuest projects are based on the teacher's curriculum, expected standards, and students' questions and interests. After looking at 'core' aspects of a country (e.g. demographics, history, geography, etc.) students undertake the exploration of such aspects of culture as: literature, art, music, religion, language, daily life, customs and traditions.

CultureQuests promote better understanding and appreciation of other cultures, strengthen literacy and research skills, and provide students with the technology skills they need in the 21st century. As such, it is one of the best examples of the integration of technology and content.

The development and expansion of the CultureQuest Consortium is being supported by the JPMorgan Chase Foundation.

State, International, and University Partners

To maximize the number of classrooms participating in CultureQuest, we are seeking partnerships with school districts, state departments of education, and other appropriate organizations and educational authorities willing to host CultureQuest for their state, region or nation. Becoming a partner involves providing professional development for teachers and, optionally, maintaining a CultureQuest website.



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
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Professional Development Opportunities for Teachers in your School or School District

In April of 2002, the Center for School Development received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to begin our work with "CultureQuest". As part of their professional development, we ask teachers to engage in their own CultureQuest projects, thereby modeling what they will do with their pupils. Most often teachers initiate CultureQuest projects in their classrooms as part of their training. Currently, professional development opportunities include:

For Teachers Skilled in Technology:

A two-hour overview of the project for those already familiar with the needed technology skills and project-based learning.

For Teachers Less Skilled in Technology:

Twenty to thirty workshop hours focused on technology applications and integration, inquiry-based learning, CultureQuest pedagogy and the study of culture. Available online or face-to-face. As part of the training, participants will create and implement a CultureQuest project in their classrooms.



For School or District Turn-Key Trainers

A one or two-day workshop for those in a position to serve as a school or district level trainer or coordinator. The workshop assumes some level of expertise in technology applications and integration and will model the CultureQuest process. It will focus on the pedagogy and technology needed to do a CultureQuest project.

The Content and Outcomes of Professional Development

Preparing teachers to lead CultureQuest classroom projects involves the learning or further review of such areas as: technology applications and integration, the pedagogy of inquiry-based instruction and cultural studies. How CultureQuest objectives and activities strengthen students' literacy skills, research skills, technology skills and their knowledge and appreciation of other peoples and cultures will be made explicit.

CultureQuest enables teachers to:

- Increase students' inquiry, analytical and research skills.
- Enhance student literacy within standards-based curriculum.
- Provide students with improved technology skills.
- Encourage students to work collaboratively with peers.
- Provide students with a deeper understanding of their own and other cultures.
- Strengthen students' motivation and curiosity.
- Publish student work on the Web for a worldwide audience.

CultureQuest serves as a model for how teachers can use technology to explore culture as well as to teach almost any content.
